2023-25 Funding

All funding is provided through the Washington State Capital Budget.

BHF Funding Availability & Timeline

The Behavioral Health Facilities Program received competitive Regional Needs, Intensive Behavioral Health Treatment Facility (IBHTF), Children and Minor Youth funding in the <u>2023-25 Washington State</u> <u>Capital Budget</u>. If all funds are not award awarded during the first competitive application round, we will hold another round in spring of 2024. 2023-25 Funds will require a 10 year service commitment period. While funds are guaranteed to be available for use through June 30, 2025, we assume funds will be re-appropriated through June 30, 2027

Commerce Program Overview

BHF General Program Information

Grants are issued to:

- Community Hospitals
- Community providers of behavioral health services to include:
 - City, town and county governments
 - Tribal governments or enterprise
 Nonprofit organizations

 - For-profit business
- Grant awards must increase capacity for behavioral health services
 - New beds, recliners, and/or outpatient facilities
- Grant rounds are planned for the autumn and spring of each year, as funding is allocated by the legislature.



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General program information

Grants reimburse capital costs

- Construction
- Capitalized equipment
- Acquisition of buildings and land

Require a 10 year commitment period (2023-25 Capital Budget)

- Deeds of trust
- In-house monitoring
- Monitoring partnerships with other state agencies



Grant rounds are planned for the autumn and spring of each year after funding is allocated by the Legislature.

General Program Information (Continued)

- Projects awarded by a grant must establish new capacity for behavioral health services in communities and address gaps in geographical behavioral health service needs.
- Awardee must meet all applicable Department of Health (DOH) licensing, certification, and construction review requirements
- Awardees must commit to serve persons who are publicly funded.
- Commerce funds may only be used for capital expenditures. These funds are not for operations.

General Program Information (Continued)

- Consultation with the regional Behavioral Health Administrative Service Organization (BH-ASO) and Managed Care Organization (MCO), as well as close coordination with the Health Care Authority (HCA) or Department of Social and Health Services (DSHS), is required of awardees to ensure grant funded facilities can become operational.
- Grant funds cannot be used for costs incurred before the date of award letter. This includes acquisition costs.






HCA Overview

90- or 180-day civil commitment beds (LTCC)

- Best practices toolkit for community hospitals and freestanding Evaluation and Treatment centers (E&Ts) is located on the Health Care Authority's <u>website</u>.
- Included facilities are community hospitals and free-standing E&Ts.
- These beds provide the means for individuals on a 90- or 180-day civil commitment order to obtain long-term psychiatric care in settings that are closer to their homes and more integrated into the community.
- The counties of need are indicated on the map included in the next slide.
- Individuals with complex medical and/or behavioral health needs and/or behaviors are the **population of need**.

HCA LTCC bed locations



Location of beds per County

- 210 current contracted beds for FY 2024; 75 beds may be used for civil conversions
- DSHS Owned (16 on line, 48 future)
- 201 HCA contracted future beds

Projected future total = 411

Counties of Need: Spokane, Benton, Chelan, Whatcom, Kitsap, Grays Harbor, and Clark

Intensive Behavioral Health Treatment Facilities

Purpose

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Intensive Behavioral Health Treatment Facilities (IBHTFs) goal is to provide ongoing care to adults (18+) who no longer benefit from treatment at state hospitals and civil commitment facilities (LTCC) but need further treatment and support to fully integrate back into their community. These 16-bed limited egress facilities focus on the needs of the person and will offer onsite behavioral health interventions, psychosocial rehabilitation, and the development of skills to integrate back into the community. These facilities will be staffed 24/7 with a clinical team to work with the individual all hours of the day if needed. More information available at:

HCA's role

HCA will work closely with the awardees of the commerce solicitation to help with starting the program development to ready the facility for admissions after construction completion.

Map of IBHTF Commerce Funded Facilities



• There are ten projects funded by the Department of Commerce, with various projected dates of completion in the 23-25 biennium.

 The first IBHTF facility, Supreme Living Olympia, opened January 2023 and has 15beds

 The second facility, Aristo Health IBHTF in Renton will open early Winter 2024 and has 16-beds.

- Projected beds for all funded facilities is 159
- The Southwest, Great Rivers, North Central, Spokane, and Greater Columbia regions have been identified as areas of need.

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Meghan DeGallier Meghan.degallier@hca.wa.gov Secure Withdrawal Management and Stabilization - SWMS

- SWMS facilities provide involuntary substance use treatment in a secure and safe environment.
- Individuals are detained to a SWMS for an initial 120 hours, and if needed an additional 14 days of court ordered treatment.
- The facility provides the client with a diagnosis, treatment, and discharge planning.
- Some SWMS are licensed to provide involuntary treatment for both Mental Health and Substance Use Disorders.

SWMS, continued

- There are four SWMS providing services in:
 - King County
 - Chelan County
 - Lewis County
 - Clark County
- Two SWMS facilities are set to open in 2025 in:
 - Whatcom County
 - Benton County
- There are currently no youth SWMS facilities.

Adult Substance Use Disorder (SUD)Treatment

- Projects address substance use disorder needs of adults with priority placement for pregnant/parenting individuals and IV drug users.
- Services can include but are not limited to SUD and co-occurring treatment, Medication for Opioid Use Disorder (MOUD) and Contingency Management (CM). - Inpatient and outpatient facilities are eligible.
- Facility must be licensed by WA State Department of Health (DOH) Please see https://doh.wa.gov/licenses-permits-and-certificates/facilities-z/behavioralhealth-agencies-bha/license-requirements



MCO = Medicaid Managed Care- Pays for services within Medicaid allowable

MCO = Wrap Around Contract – GFS – Medicaid eligible person, not Medicaid services


ASO – GFS – Crisis Services, Other Proviso \$\$, Can Hold Other Contracts, Block Grant

Direct Contracts – Specific Proviso Funding, Block Grant, Other funds

Local Funds – Used within each region

Apple Health Foster Care is a statewide program. Integrated managed care is provided through Apple Health Core Connections (Coordinated Care of Washington - CCW).




Apple Health Managed Care In WA

- Five MCOs are contracted with HCA to deliver physical and behavioral health:
 - Amerigroup
 - Community Health Plan of WA
 - Coordinated Care
 - Molina Healthcare
 - United Healthcare
- Coordinated Care holds the contract to manage healthcare for foster care children





Provider Costs Embedded in Capitation Rates





Capitation Rates Notes

- MCO capitation rates are based on the cost to the MCO to administer the Apple Health program
- Key elements of MCO cost are MCO payments to providers for Medicaid clients
- Provider costs are a consideration in MCO and provider negotiations when contracting
- Provider service costs currently embedded in claims and nonclaim benefit cost used in MCO rate setting



BH-ASO Population-based services

Provide crisis services to all individuals, regardless of insurance

- Crisis line (24/7)
- Mobile Outreach Crisis Teams
- Crisis Triage & Stabilization
- Crisis Intervention
- Specific funding PACT, New Journeys, Discharge, Jail
- Administer Involuntary Treatment Act (ITA)
 - Conduct ITA investigations
 - Write ITA petitions and detain individuals when indicated
 - Monitor compliance with less restrictive treatment services
 - Coordinate necessary services including due process

DOH Overview

Licensing and Construction Review

Licensing

- An Outpatient program would only need a Behavioral Health Agency license (BHA)
- A Residential Treatment Facility needs a BHA and an RTF license.
- The application process for these applications may take, at a minimum, up to 6 weeks to complete.
- All facilities will be required to complete an initial application as well as an initial review, after one year of service.

Licensing Requirements

The requirements for these facility types are dependent on services provided and may include things such as:

- Mental Health Professional on staff/available 24/7
- Ensuring a safe staffing pattern
- Providing services on a 24/7 basis
- Coordination with Community Providers including Emergency rooms, Evaluation and Treatment Centers, DCR and local first responders
- May provide services to involuntary/voluntary individuals
- Training plan for all staff members
- Provide a secure facility for individuals

Things to know...

- If the agency is requesting licensing for an RTF by remodeling or building a new building a project, they must get approval from Construction Review (CRS) within DOH. Approval by CRS must take place before the BHA/RTF application can be approved.
- A complete list of licensure requirements is documented in WAC 246-341 (BHA) and WAC 246-337 (RTF).

Enhanced Services Facilities (ESF's)

- Clients discharging/diverting from the State Hospitals
- Up to 16 beds with private rooms
- RN on site 20 hour per week, LPN on site whenever RN it not
- MHP on site 8 hours per day
- 1:4 staffing ration with enhanced staff training
- Monthly reviews of medication management and behavior support

Community Stability Supports (CSS)

- Specialty contract for ALF's with EARC contracts
- Clients discharging or diverting from State Hospitals or from Acute Hospitals with significant behaviors
- RN/LPN on site 40 hrs/week, on call evening and weekends
- Caregiving 24/7 with enhanced staff training
- MHP 40 hrs/week on site
- Behavior support and crisis planning
- Activities assistant 40 hrs/week
- Tier 1 and Tier 2 level of support: 1:6 and 1:8 staffing ratio

Specialized Dementia Care Program

- For clients diagnosed with Alzheimer's disease or other irreversible dementia
- Clients receiving or eligible for Medicaid
- Person-centered care, supervision and activities
- Dementia specific training for staff
- Awake staff 24 hours a day
- Safe outdoor environment with walking paths and access to a secure outdoor area
- Intermittent nursing services
